Curriculum News

Across all classes this week, we have been administering termly assessment across reading, spelling, maths and SPAG. The children have all worked so hard when answering a range of different questions. Teachers will now use these assessments to plan boosters and lessons to go over gaps in learning.

Class Banksy

In maths this week, the children in Reception started to identify more complex patterns. For example, red, red, blue, red, red, blue. How does the pattern continue? The children then progressed onto using objects both in and outside the classroom to explore more complex patterns. **For example, one tyre, two twigs, one tyre, two twigs.** The children in Year 1 have continued looking at and securing their knowledge of equal groups. For example, if we had 30 counters, how many equal groups of 5 can be made? The children then used different objects to share equally between groups. For example, we have 16 bananas and want to share them equally into 4 groups. How many bananas are in each group? In science, the children have been learning about different of herbivores and understanding which animals are vegetarian and what they eat to survive. The children then looked at how not all herbivores are small. For example, elephants and giraffes and big, but still herbivores. In art, the focus has been mixing primary colours to make secondary colours.

Class Blake

In ICT this week, the children have been learning how to classify animals using a branching database. The children have been taught how to answer 'yes' and 'no' questions when grouping. For example, is the animal nocturnal? Is the animal a carnivore? In maths, the children have been solving a range of arithmetic questions. For example, what is 54 x 3? 345 + 127 = and 878 - 67 =. In reasoning, the children have been solving a range of questions such as, 100 more than 63 is? Explain why 130 is a multiple of 10. If a rectangle has a length of 6cm and width of 2cm, what is the perimeter? In English, the children have been looking at the key features of newspapers, linked to 'TAKE ONE BOOK' Week and writing their own headlines to match articles. In art, the focus has been sketching when drawing a frog (the main characters from the book, TUESDAY) and using shade and tone effectively.

Class Wiltshire

In maths this week, the children have been solving a range of arithmetic questions. For example, what is 345×67 What is 45.87 + 8.67? What is 0.123 x 1000? What is 2/3 divided by 5? The children have been using taught written methods to calculate as well as mental counting methods. The children have also been solving different mathematical reasoning questions. For example, if I spend £1.39 and 86p on items in a shop, how much change would I get from £5? Someone scores 16 out of 25 in a test, what is this as a percentage? What is 3/8 as a decimal rounded to 1dp? In English, the focus has been newspaper reports and recognising the key features - headlines, subtitles, captions, direct quotes, and formal language. The children have looked at different examples of newspaper articles and have planned and written their own.
