Currículum News



Class Rock 'N' Roll

In maths this week, the children in Reception have been learning how to match different objects. This has been in the form of children looking at different objects (**pencils**, **cubes**, **teddies**) and explaining which objects make a match and why. The learning then progressed onto the children talking about matching cards. The children in Year 1 have been learning how to sort objects into groups and explaining why they have made these decisions. For example, 'How could we group different coloured triangles, circles and squares?' The learning then progressed onto the children counting objects fluently and starting on zero. Key questions have included, 'Does it matter which object I count first? 'How do you know you have counted all the objects?' In English, the children have started the text, 'We're going on a bear hunt.' The focus has been for the children to join in with predictable words and phrases, act out parts of the story and say aloud what they would like to write about. 'You can't through it, you can't go...' In science, the children have been labelling parts of the human body and recognising where they are. For example, nose, elbow, neck, feet, and eye.' In art, the focus has been mark making. The focus has been for the children to create their own patterns using different marks and lines and shades using pencils.

Class Pop

In maths this week, the children in Year 2 have been writing numbers up to one hundred and using place value cards to support with this. The learning then progressed onto plotting multiples of 10 onto a number line to 100. For example, 'Can you estimate where 70 will go on the number line? 'How do you know?' The children in Year 3 have been exploring hundreds, tens and ones. This has included asking questions to determine which number is greater and smaller. The children have been using a part-whole model along with base ten. The children have been completing flexible partitioning with different 3-digit numbers. In English, the focus has been for the children to describe characters using adjectives and noun phrase. An example noun phrase would be: 'The gold-plated shield on his arm.' Shield is the noun, and this is used to support the noun phrase. The children then built on the knowledge of this to invent a new character to take place of the dragon. In science, the children have been looking at the human skeleton and what would happen if we didn't have certain bones in our bodies and how important it is to look after them.

Class Dísco

In maths this week, the children in Years 4,5 and 6 have continued securing their knowledge of place value in numbers. The children in Year 4 have been representing and partitioning numbers up to 10,000, the children in Year 5 have been doing this in numbers up to 1,000,000 and the children in year 6 have been partitioning numbers up 10,000,000. There has been a clear progression of skills through the three-year groups. Towards the end of the week, the children have been focusing on comparing and ordering numbers. For example, 'Why is 8,901,967 greater than 8,901,697?' In English, the children have been predicting what might happen next, how characters are feeling, and creating a setting description. In science, the focus has been for the children sort and classify plants and animals. In art, the children have built on their horizon points last week by experimenting with different water colours. In geography, the focus this week has been looking at the climate in Scandinavia after finding out last week where in the world these countries are.
