Curriculum News

Class Banksy

In maths this week, the children in Reception have been looking at different 2D shapes and which shapes belong in the same group or not. For example, 'This shape does not belong in this group because it's been rotated' and 'These two circles are large and the other one is small.' The learning then progressed onto the children rotating different 2D shapes to make patterns and to describe movement. The children in Year 1 have been securing their knowledge of finding quarters of shapes, and the progressed onto looking at position and movement in shapes. For example, 'This circle moves two spaces to the left - what is its new position? In English, the children's focus has been creating, planning, and writing their own stories based on the text 'There's a dinosaur in my bathtub.' This marks the end of this learning sequence. The focus has been using capital letters, full stops, finger spaces, joining words and using known phonics sounds to spell words. In geography, the focus has been re-capping continents and the planning a journey across the world. For example, 'Let's start in Europe, travel to Asia, and then onto Australasia.' In RE, the focus has been 'What do Muslims celebrate?' The children worked in groups to write down things they are thankful for.

Class Blake

In maths this week, the children in Year 2 have been securing their understanding when finding a half, a quarter, a third and three quarters of objects and shapes. Fractions are a very abstract concept for children as children must realise that a third is smaller than a half even though they are taught the 3 is greater than 2. The children in Year 3 have been learning how to find fractions of amounts. For example, there are 12 apples and 2/3 get eaten. How many got eaten? The children needed to do 12 divided by 3 to get the answer 4, and then multiply this by 2 to get the answer 8. In English, the SPAG focus has been learning how to use the possessive apostrophe. For example, 'That is Harry's bag' and 'Look at Thomas' work.' 'The giant kid's playground is the wrong use of a possessive apostrophe, as this shows the playground belongs to one kid. It should be 'The giant kids' playground to show plural possession. In Art, the children have been looking at how 'Recycled Art' and what simple structures can be made using different materials.

Class Wiltshire

The children in Year 6 this week have been completed MOCK SATs papers across reading, maths and SPAG. The children completed last year's test papers and I am very proud as how hard they have worked, and the positive attitude shown. In maths, the children in Year 4 have been learning how to order a set of decimals and round them to the nearest whole number. For example, 'What is 14.32 rounded to the nearest whole number?' Why is 6.51 greater than 6.198? The learning then progressed onto converting decimals to fractions. For example, 25/100 is equivalent to '4. The children in Year 5 have been learning how to calculate angles around a point and on s straight line. For example, 'If there is an acute angle on a straight line measuring 47 degrees, what is the other angle?' In English, the children have been examining propaganda posters from World War 2 as well as looking at different meals eaten during times of rationing. In science, the focus has been reproductive parts of plants.
