Curriculum News

Class Banksy

In maths, the children have been comparing 2-digit numbers and explaining why by discussing place value. The 'Naughty Bus' has been continued during English and for shared reading. In geography, the children have been looking at compass points and directional language. In history, the children have continued looking at toys. How times have changed since the 1980s!

Class Blake

In maths this week, the children have continued to identify numbers on a blank number line, counting both forwards and backwards in 1s and 2s. In science, the children conducted an experiment to test how brittle plastic and glass are and to see which materials are opaque, translucent, and transparent. In guided reading, the children have continued reading 'The Giraffe, Pelly and Me.' The children have been predicting, looking at new vocabulary and drawing a story map.

Class Wiltshire

In English, the children have continued reading Spaceboy. The focus has been writing a character description using descriptive vocabulary and conjunctions to explain why. In maths, the children have been rounding and ordering numbers up to one million. For example, what is 346,852 rounded to the nearest thousand? Year 6 have continued their arithmetic boosters with Mr Merriman to develop their test technique. In music, 'Livin on a prayer' has been practiced and in geography, the children have been looking at the features of mountains.
