Currículum News



Class Banksy

In maths this week, the children in Reception have been earning how to manipulate, compose and decompose shapes. For example, the children were given a set of patterned blocks which they had to build as many different triangles as they could. The learning the progressed onto the children cutting rectangles in half and seeing what two new shapes have been created. The children in Year 1 have been learning about ordinal numbers. For example, 2nd, 4th, 11th, and 9th. Key questions have included, 'Which athlete finished 3rd in the race?' Who was finished in 5th place?' In English, the children have been looking at the text, 'Tyrannosaurus Drip' and have been studying different photographs to decide how different characters are feeling and why. In RE, the focus has been looking at what Muslims celebrate, and the children thought about, and wrote down, things we are thankful for.

Class Blake

In maths this week, the children in Year 2 have been securing their understanding when finding half and a quarter of numbers. For example, 'If we know that ½ of 12 is 6, then a ¼ of 12 is 3. The children in Year 3 have started looking at equivalent fractions. For example, ½ is equivalent to 5/10, and ¼ is equivalent to 2/8. The children used bar models to help them calculate and to see visually how equivalent fractions work. In English, the focus has been explanation texts and looking at the key features. To support this, the children have been learning how to use past and present verbs correctly as well writing in standard English. For example, 'The boys was playing' is incorrect. It should be, 'The boys were playing.' In science, the children worked in groups to plant bulbs and seeds and then choose a place where they think they would grow quicker and more effectively.

Class Wiltshire

The children in Year 6 this week have been completing their final revision sessions before starting their SATs next week. The children have been dividing fractions, measuring angles, securing knowledge about possessive pronouns, and determiners to name a few. The children in Year 5 have been learning how to convert fractions to percentages and decimals. For example, 13/100 is equivalent to 13% and 0.13. The learning then extended onto finding equivalent fractions such as 4/25 is equivalent to 16/100 and therefore 16% and 0.16. The children in Year 4 have been learning about different types of angles and understanding angles when turning. For example, 'Where would I be facing if I turned 90 degrees anti-clockwise?' In English, the children have been writing a job description for a lighthouse keeper and writing a persuasive letter to the government to convince them not to eradicate lighthouses. In history, the focus has been learning about what jobs women did World War 2, and in art, the children have been learning how dazzle and camouflage was used during the war.
