We are very pleased that the funding is having a positive impact on the pupils eligible for the funding across the school. Pupils eligible for funding leave Gaddesden Row well-prepared for secondary school. Pupils make good progress in all areas often attaining higher in comparison to pupils who are non-PPG. The strong outcomes are as a result of of pupil premium being a high priority in the school. Pupils are identified in planning, are discussed first in pupil progress meetings and continue to be an important focus for all staff.
